The Board of Chiropractic Examiners (Board) is the state agency responsible for licensing, regulating, and disciplining chiropractic physicians in the State of Oregon. Greg Ullman, (Applicant), applied to be a chiropractor with the Board to practice as a chiropractic physician in the State of Oregon. The Board proposes to license Applicant with the following restrictions.

On January 3, 2017, the Board received Applicant's application for a chiropractic license in Oregon. On question seven of the application, where Applicant was asked if he had ever been arrested or charged with a violation, misdemeanor or felony, Applicant responded yes. On question eight, Applicant also replied yes to the question if he had been convicted of, pled guilty, or no contest to any offense, misdemeanor, or felony, which could have resulted in imprisonment. Applicant also answered yes to question nine as to if he had used controlled substance in a manner that violated the law, and question ten, if he had been treated for substance abuse. Applicant's history showed three arrests and convictions. In 2003, Applicant was arrested for criminal possession of drug paraphernalia which was dismissed in November, 2003. In 2005, Applicant was charged with driving under the influence and criminal possession of dangerous drugs, and was convicted in October 2005. Applicant was fined. In 2007, Applicant was charged with conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine and marijuana and was convicted of a felony. The sanction was 38 months in custody with 5 years of supervised probation.

On January 3, 2017, the Board received a letter from Applicant where he provided a written explanation as to the circumstances of his convictions and arrest history.

The Board was concerned at Applicant's criminal conviction background in his application and Applicant's arrest/conviction history and the types of arrests that were made by law enforcement.

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4 CONCLUSIONS OF LAW
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6 As described in paragraph 1 and 2 above, the Board finds that the acts and conduct of
7 Applicant in his application and responses to such, are cause to refuse to grant a license to
8 Applicant. The arrest and conviction history as noted above, is a violation of **ORS**
9 **684.100(1)(d), OAR 811-035-0015(13)** unprofessional or dishonorable conduct and conviction
10 of a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or a felony. The Board also feels pursuant to ORS
11 670.280(3) the arrest history and convictions are substantially related to the fitness and ability of
12 the applicant to engage in the activity for which the license is required. However, the Board feels
13 that placing a limitation on the Applicant's license will adequately protect the public and allow
14 Applicant to pursue his profession.

22 complaint as follows:
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24 a. The parties wish to settle and resolve this matter without further proceedings and
25 have agreed to enter this stipulated final order. Applicant is aware of his right to a hearing with
26 his attorney present to contest the charges and hereby waives that right and agrees to entry of this
27 final order. The signature of this order also waives any right to appeal.

29 b. Prior to licensure, Applicant agrees to submit to a psychological evaluation by a
30 Board approved practitioner that will deem Applicant safe to practice chiropractic. Applicant
31 agrees to comply with any recommendations made for treatment by the practitioner. This will be
32 at Applicant's cost. Applicant will provide the examination outcome to the Board prior to
33 issuance of any license.
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35 c. Applicant, once licensed, will not be employed in any capacity where prescription
36 drugs are dispensed, ordered, or written prescriptions are issued to patients, for a period of 10
37 years from the date of licensure.
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39 d. If Applicant leaves the State of Oregon prior to completion of the terms of this
40 order, the requirements are tolled.
